#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR

I heard someone say once that life is best understood backward but experienced forward. I think that makes sense. Only upon reflection can we really see the beauty in the story we are writing with our lives. The rest of the time, we humans ride out an involuntary march towards death. It's kind of sad when you think of it. The sheer brevity of it all. We all get to spend an average of 80 years or so stuck together on this planet and then we disappear.

Death used to scare me in a serious way, but now it's more like a motivator for my soul to get moving. I don't think about death often, but when I do, it stirs up in me an energy and an urgency - Stop wasting time and get moving, 80 years comes quick. Right this very second there are millions of people in this world who are running away from things that could hurt them. They are people who have been forced to leave their home in order to escape war, persecution, or natural disaster. Some are leaving by their own accord, but many are forced against their will. Some are families trying to stay together, but many are youth who have been separated from their parents, siblings, and family. They are often alone, without hope and dignity, and desperately seeking some semblance of what we all might refer to as a 'normal life'. They are often hungry, need a place to stay, need a helping hand, and need love and kindness to shine a light on a better tomorrow or they will likely quite possibly die. These are the people we fight for. The vulnerable. The ones who have left everything in order to restart a life. We call them Refugee Claimants - they are the people who have been separated from the people they love, in order to gain one shot at a future worth living. They are quite literally moving from a place of death and are in search of any place that will give them a glimpse of life. Friends — that is why Matthew House exists.

Our mission at Matthew House is to inspire hope, restore dignity, and empower independence for refugee claimants in the city of Toronto and across Canada. Hundreds of millions of people will find themselves as refugee claimants during our lifetime, and it is our vision to help them find a place of refuge, a home, and a new life. Our name 'Matthew House' is derived from Matthew 25:35. In this verse, Jesus makes an impassioned plea for us to take care of the most vulnerable by saying 'whatever you did for the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me'. This is our hope and the fuel that binds our work together: To serve those in need and in turn, serve lesus.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I would like to thank you for coming alongside us to help the world's most vulnerable, including those coming from some of the world's toughest places, reach their God-given potential. 80 years comes quick — let's not waste this time we've been given.

#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR LEADERS

This past year was a year of many transitions — both for our residents and for the Matthew House community as a whole. We welcomed three newborn babies. Our awesome staff and supporters threw baby showers, arranged support for the new moms and helped them transition into the community. We cheered as our residents graduated high school and college, completed ESL courses, got their work permit or passed their hearing. And when they were ready to take the next step, we supported 48 residents with housing searches, furniture and the commitment to stay in touch.

In 2019 Matthew House saw a critical demand for emergency refugee shelter and we continued to operate our homes at capacity. There is simply not enough supportive housing for the most vulnerable refugees: unaccompanied refugee youth, young mothers and those with special needs. But Matthew House gives residents that support and belonging through our small homes, our dedicated house parents and a loving community.

We are especially grateful in 2019 for the incredible support of Carolyn Madonia, a long-time volunteer and board member who generously stepped in and assumed the role of Interim Executive Director during a period of leadership transition. Without her compassion and service, we would not have had such an amazingly successful year.

In June we hosted our largest ever World Refugee Day celebration in our back yard. By year end, we received confirmation of a grant to expand our Refugee Hearing Preparation program virtually to cities beyond Toronto.

And finally, in November 2019, Jacky Tuinstra Harrison joined the team as the new Executive Director of Matthew House.

By year end, we had a renewed team under fresh leadership and a real sense of inspiration for the future. Our thanks to everyone who has partnered with us in this journey: you are truly giving refugees a welcome home.

#### OUR SERVICES

In 2019, 64,000 refugee claimants arrived in Canada fleeing persecution. Many were numbered among the homeless. Matthew House provides more than just a shelter — we welcome vulnerable refugees into a home where they will feel safe and cared for. We provide support and services that are uniquely tailored to the refugee experience.

#### Welcome to Canada Program

Our settlement team provided **50 Orientation to Canada workshops**, offering lessons about Canadian culture, banking, budgeting, riding transit, finding apartments to rent, community services and more. Through our network of caring volunteers we arranged for mentoring and organized day trips and social events.

#### Shelter and Support Services

Matthew House restores refugees' dignity with shelter and support in a welcoming, home-like setting. Our staff assisted residents with professional referrals, in-house tutoring, work permit applications and more. Our volunteer cooking program currently has 14 dedicated volunteers who come to our reception house to cook meals and share in community. Thanks to them, we enjoyed over **700 home-cooked meals** this year.

#### Refugee Hearing Preparation Program (RHP)

In 2019 the RHP program ran at full capacity holding hearing simulations daily, impacting **over 830 claimants** in our city! We are pleased to announce that thanks to a grant from the Law Foundation of Ontario, we will be expanding our Refugee Hearing Program (RHP) to Hamilton, Kitchener and Windsor very soon.

### NEW LIFE IN OUR HOMES

Over the years, we've had many babies brought to Matthew House, but this year we had three babies born while the moms were living at Matthew House. One of our moms, Melat, arrived in Canada when she was eight months pregnant. She was anxious and did not know where to turn for help. Thanks to the support of the Matthew House community, Melat had everything she needed to welcome baby Amanawit, whose names means "Peaceful" in Amharic. "I want to thank all the amazing Matthew House staff, volunteers, and donors who supported me. When I arrived at Matthew House from Ethiopia I was pregnant and all alone," says Melat. Few shelters in Toronto specialize in the needs of refugee claimants and even fewer are able to care for vulnerable moms in a home-like setting, as Matthew House does. Your generosity supports vulnerable moms and babies just like Melat and Amanawit. "If it was not for you, I don't know what would have happened," says Melat. "Thanks to you, I felt loved, protected, and at peace in the days leading up to the birth of my daughter."



# THE TOOLS TO MOVE FORWARD



Parents Marco\* and Marianna\* and their two children initially arrived at our reception home full of uncertainty and stress. Yet we were amazed at this family's resilience and dedication. After enrolling the children in school, Marco, an engineer, offered his time to make improvements to our home. He helped with electrical issues and re-did the carpeting on our stairs. Marianna helped with cooking meals for the Matthew House family and together they brought an air of positivity to our home that infected us all. They also diligently studied English daily. After a long search for affordable housing, the family was able to move to a place which required some renovations, but they were up for the challenge! Good thing Marco had proved to be so handy!

"Dear Matthew House, We are going to use the new tools, which were our Christmas gifts, today. We recall those great moments spent in Matthew House and the persons who let us feel part of something huge! After having held on to many adversities, God finally has blessed us by letting us have our own place. All my family are helping to install all the blessed things what we have received from you. I am very glad to let you know that today at this moment we are using your blessed gift."
